
Among current pretrial jail inmates assigned to Judge Anastasio:

- 88% of Black defendants (141 out of 160)
- 63% of Hispanic White defendants (55 out of 87)
- 70% of non-Hispanic White defendants (53 out of 75)

were detained per night based on inability to pay

Last week, among current pretrial jail inmates assigned to Judge Anastasio, 88% of Black defendants (141 out of 160 on an average night), 63% of Hispanic White defendants (55 out of 87 on an average night), and 70% of non-Hispanic White defendants (53 out of 75 on an average night) were detained in Harris County Jail because they couldn't afford money bail.

Judge Anastasio's racial difference in the share detained due to inability to pay for Black and Non-Hispanic White defendants is among the 25% worst in Harris County. Her racial difference in the share detained due to inability to pay for Hispanic and Non-Hispanic White defendants is among the 25% best in Harris County.
